Monitoring

- Share definition from New Coordinator Handbook
 - Monitoring can be defined as a process to ensure compliance with applicable State and Federal laws. This includes:

- The Elementary and Secondary Education Act (ESEA), as amended by the Every Student Succeeds Act (ESSA)
- Uniform administrative Requirements, Cost Principles, and Audit Requirements for federal Awards (Uniform Guidance: 2 Code of Federal Regulations (CFR) Part 200)
- EDGAR Education Department General Administrative Regulations
- The monitoring process helps ED and SEAs to:
 - Ensure compliance
 - Identify technical assistance needs
 - Identify trends (both positive and negative)
 - Highlight promising practices
 - Build relationships with subgrantees
 - Mitigate risk

Federal Monitoring

- Discuss the difference between Federal and SEA monitoring. Explain we will start first with a discussion on Federal Monitoring
- Share with the group the <u>federal monitoring protocol</u>
- Introduction of Program Officer Jeff Buehler
 - o Questions for Jeff:
 - Can you tell us a little about the overall process for selecting states to be monitored?
 - What is the difference between comprehensive monitoring and targeted monitoring?
 - If a state is selected for monitoring, how will they be notified and what does the pre-monitoring process and support look like?
 - What should a State coordinator expect during the actual monitoring? Who should be involved in the monitoring? How many days? How many subgrantees are interviewed?
 - How will State coordinators be made aware of any areas of noncompliance and what is the process for resolving these issues?
- Share past federal monitoring reports with State coordinators

 - Ouestions for State coordinator:
 - Leading up to the monitoring, what did you expect?
 - Going into the monitoring process, you had to prepare and upload a lot of information. How did you go about organizing, collecting, and posting all the artifacts?

- What advice would you give a State coordinator that may be monitored in the next year or two?
- How did the monitoring experience compare to your expectations?

 <u>handbook</u> highlighting the responsibilities and authority granted in the CFR. This
 discussion will include:
 - Risk assessments
 - Monitoring schedules
 - Monitoring protocols and guidelines
 - Ensuring LEAs and SAs are monitoring facilities
 - Monitoring follow-up
